There will be many opportunities for you to apply what you are learning to your own written work, which will include literary analyses, letters, narratives, research presentations, and essays. You are encouraged to

select topics, texts, and assignments that interest and stretch you. In addition, as classroom discussion, active participation, and working cooperatively in small groups are vital to your development as an independent thinker, you can expect to engage in these activities regularly.

Homework as practice is generally graded for completion: completed homework will receive a grade of 1 point, incomplete or late homework will receive a grade of 0.5 points, and homework that is not done will receive a grade of 0 points. What if you are absent? You can turn in the completed homework the day you return for full credit. What if you were present, but you are struggling with the assigned work? After trying for 10 minutes, please stop and email me to let me know where you got confused. We can check in the next day to clear up any questions you have, and you will get an extra day to complete the work.

Assessment

This class is graded using a total points system. Grades will be updated biweekly and available online through Aspen. Graded work will be stored in your classroom folder or in Google Classroom; you are encouraged to review your work with your parents. You will be assessed in two ways each term:



- 1. **Formative Assessments**: Classwork and Engagement (1-10 pts per assignment), Homework Completion (1 pt per assignment), Quizzes and Mini-Projects (10-20 pts per assignment), and
- 2. **Summative Assessments**: Tests and Major Projects (50-100 pts per assignment).

Any assessment on which you have scored less than 80% can be made up to 80%. Use the error analysis sheet to look for error patterns and identify concepts that were difficult. Meet with me; bring the error analysis and original assessment. I will review the material with you, and you can make corrections, build your skills, and raise your grade.
